At the beginning of the legal year, we gather in the presence of Almighty God, who is the judge of all and who knows the secrets of our hearts, to renew our commitment to the service of the Crown and of all people in the cause of justice.

We acknowledge a shared high calling, a common commitment to a justice that we all can recognise, administered without fear or favour, affection or ill will. We seek God's strength and guidance that we might remain true to our calling, subtle as we apply ourselves to the causes before us, and wise as we influence the development of the law.

We pray for The Right Honourable Alex Chalk, the Lord Chancellor and Secretary of State for Justice, for The Right Honourable The Lord Burnett, Lord Chief Justice of England and Wales, and for all who make and administer the law, here in Wales, in the rest of the United Kingdom and in the other legal jurisdictions represented here today.

In this holy place, we ask God to sustain us in our life and work, to grant us humility and sound judgment, to forgive our errors, and to inspire us in our service. Here on earth may we serve more faithfully that heavenly justice in which, ultimately, we can trust alone.

So let us pray in our preferred language for the coming of God's kingdom on earth, saying, as Jesus taught us:

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

‡ Please sit. The First Reading is read by Mrs Justice Jefford, Presiding Judge for Wales:

A reading from the third chapter of the First Book of Kings, beginning at the sixteenth verse.

Then there came two women who were prostitutes, to the king, and stood before him. The one woman said, "Oh, my lord, I and this woman dwell in one house; and I was delivered of a child with her in the house. It happened the third day after I was delivered, that this woman was delivered also; and we were together; there was no stranger with us in the house, save we two in the house. This woman's child died in the night, because she lay on it. She arose at midnight, and took my son from beside me, while your handmaid slept, and laid it in her bosom, and laid her dead child in my bosom. When I rose in the morning to give my child suck, behold, it was dead; but when I had looked at it in the morning, behold, it was not my son, whom I bore". The other woman said, "No; but the living is my son, and the dead is your son". This said, "No; but the dead is your son, and the living is my son". Thus they spoke before the king. Then said the king, "The one says, 'This is my son who lives, and your son is the dead': and the other says, "No; but your son is the dead, and my son is the living". The king said, "Get me a sword". They brought a sword before the king. The king said, "Divide the living child in two, and give half to the one, and half to the other". Then spoke the woman whose the living child was to the king, (for her heart yearned over her son,) and she said, "Oh, my lord, give her the living child, and in no way kill it!": but the other said, "It shall be neither mine nor yours; divide it". Then the king answered, "Give her the living child, and in no way kill it: she is the mother of it". All Israel heard of the judgment which the king had judged; and they feared the king: for they saw that the wisdom of God was in him, to do justice.

‡ Please sit. The Second Reading is read by the Right Honourable Dame Sue Carr, Lady Chief Justice of England and Wales:

A reading from the twenty-first chapter of the Gospel according to Saint Matthew, beginning at the thirty-third verse.

'Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watch-tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants? They said to him, 'He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.'

Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

"The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes"?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.'

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.
